A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PORNOGRAPHY OFFENSES AGAINST CHILDREN.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 712, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3	and to read as follows:
4	"§712- Disseminating material that is pornographic for
5	minors to other minors over the Internet or by electronic
6	communication. (1) A person commits the offense of
7	disseminating material that is pornographic for minors over the
8	Internet or by electronic communication if, knowing the
9	character and content of the material disseminated, the person
10	knowingly transmits the material directly to a specific
11	individual who is known or believed by the person to be a minor
12	material that is pornographic.
13	(2) A transmission of material that is pornographic for
14	minors or in a listserve or chatroom shall not be a crime under
15	this section, unless the transmission is made directly to a

specific individual who is known or believed by the transmitter

to be a minor.

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1	(3) For	purposes of determining whether material is				
2	"pornographic for minors", the standards of the national					
3	community shall be applied.

6	SECTION 2. Section 712-1210, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

- 15 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 16 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 17 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Pornography Offenses Against Children

Description:

Creates the felony of disseminating material that is pornographic for minors. Amends the offense of promoting pornography to minors to extend the prohibition against disseminating pornographic material to minors to include disseminating pornographic material to another person who represents that person to be a minor under the age of eighteen; and adds the offense of promoting child abuse in the third degree to the information charging law.
