
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PORNOGRAPHY OFFENSES AGAINST CHILDREN.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 712, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3 and to read as follows:

4 "§712- Disseminating material that is pornographic for
5 minors to other minors over the Internet or by electronic
6 communication. (1) A person commits the offense of
7 disseminating material that is pornographic for minors over the
8 Internet or by electronic communication if, knowing the
9 character and content of the material disseminated, the person
10 knowingly transmits the material directly to a specific
11 individual who is known or believed by the person to be a minor,
12 material that is pornographic.

13 (2) A transmission of material that is pornographic for
14 minors or in a listserve or chatroom shall not be a crime under
15 this section, unless the transmission is made directly to a
16 specific individual who is known or believed by the transmitter
17 to be a minor.



1 (3) For purposes of determining whether material is
2 "pornographic for minors", the standards of the national
3 community shall be applied.

4 (4) Disseminating material that is pornographic for minors
5 over the Internet or by electronic device is a class felony."

6 SECTION 2. Section 712-1210, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7 amended by amending the definition of "pornographic for minors"
8 to read as follows:

9 "Pornographic for minors." Any material or performance is
10 "pornographic for minors" if:

11 (1) It is primarily devoted to explicit and detailed
12 narrative accounts of sexual excitement, sexual
13 conduct, or sadomasochistic abuse; and:

14 (a) It is presented in such a manner that the average
15 person applying contemporary community standards,
16 would find that, taken as a whole, it appeals to
17 a minor's prurient interest[+] in sex;

18 (b) It is patently offensive to prevailing standards
19 in the adult community as a whole with respect to
20 what is suitable material for minors; and

21 (c) Taken as a whole, it lacks serious literary,
22 artistic, political, or scientific value; or



1 (2) It contains any photograph, drawing, or similar visual
 2 representation of any person of the age of puberty or
 3 older revealing such person with less than a fully
 4 opaque covering of his or her genitals and pubic area,
 5 or depicting such person in a state of sexual
 6 excitement or engaged in acts of sexual conduct or
 7 sadomasochistic abuse; and:

8 (a) It is presented in such a manner that the average
 9 person, applying contemporary community
 10 standards, would find that, taken as a whole, it
 11 appeals to a minor's prurient interest; ~~and~~

12 (b) Taken as a whole, it lacks serious literary,
 13 artistic, political, or scientific value~~[-]~~; and

14 (c) It depicts or describes sexual conduct in a
 15 patently offensive way."

16 SECTION 3. Section 712-1215, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 17 amended by amending subsection (1) to read as follows:

18 "(1) A person commits the offense of promoting pornography
 19 for minors if:

20 (a) Knowing its character and content, the person
 21 disseminates ~~[to a minor]~~ material ~~[which]~~ that is
 22 pornographic for minors~~[-]~~ to a minor known by the



1 person to be under the age of eighteen years, or who
2 the person believes to be under the age of eighteen
3 years;

4 (b) Knowing the character and content of a motion picture
5 film or other performance which [~~in whole or in~~
6 ~~part,~~] is pornographic for minors, the person:

7 (i) Exhibits such motion picture film or other
8 performance to a minor; or

9 (ii) Sells to a minor an admission ticket or pass to
10 premises where there is exhibited or to be
11 exhibited such motion picture film or other
12 performance; or

13 (iii) Admits a minor to premises where there is
14 exhibited or to be exhibited such motion picture
15 film or other performance."

16 SECTION 4. Section 806-83, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

18 "(a) Criminal charges may be instituted by written
19 information for a felony when the charge is a class C felony
20 under section 19-3.5 (voter fraud); section 128D-10 (knowing
21 releases); section 132D-14(a)(1), (2)(A), and (3) (relating to
22 penalties for failure to comply with requirements of sections



1 132D-7, 132D-10, and 132D-16); section 134-24 (place to keep
2 unloaded firearms other than pistols and revolvers); section

9 pen register, trap and trace device, and mobile tracking device
10 prohibited); or section 846E-9(b) (failure to comply with
11 covered offender registration requirements)."

12 SECTION 5. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
13 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
14 begun, before the effective date of this Act.

15 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
16 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

17 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Pornography Offenses Against Children

Description:

Creates the felony of disseminating material that is pornographic for minors. Amends the offense of promoting pornography to minors to extend the prohibition against disseminating pornographic material to minors to include disseminating pornographic material to another person who represents that person to be a minor under the age of eighteen; and adds the offense of promoting child abuse in the third degree to the information charging law. (SD1)
